Removed mine today. Step one - get directly under the bow end of the keel slot and remove the four bolts holding two metal plates (one port and one starboard). I had to clean lots of barnacles and a bad fiberglass repair. This photo shows one removed and one in place.

Once the bolts are out, pry off the two plates and you will see the ends of two plastic wedges. If they don't fall out, work them loose with a flat screwdriver.

Once the wedges are out, you should be able to rotate the forward end of the centerboard down and out of the slot. I had to rip a piece of wood off my cradle to make room. There is a plastic pivot pin and a plastic washer on each side. I had one bolt missing, and one broke when trying to remove

it, so that will be another adventure trying to reassemble. Good luck

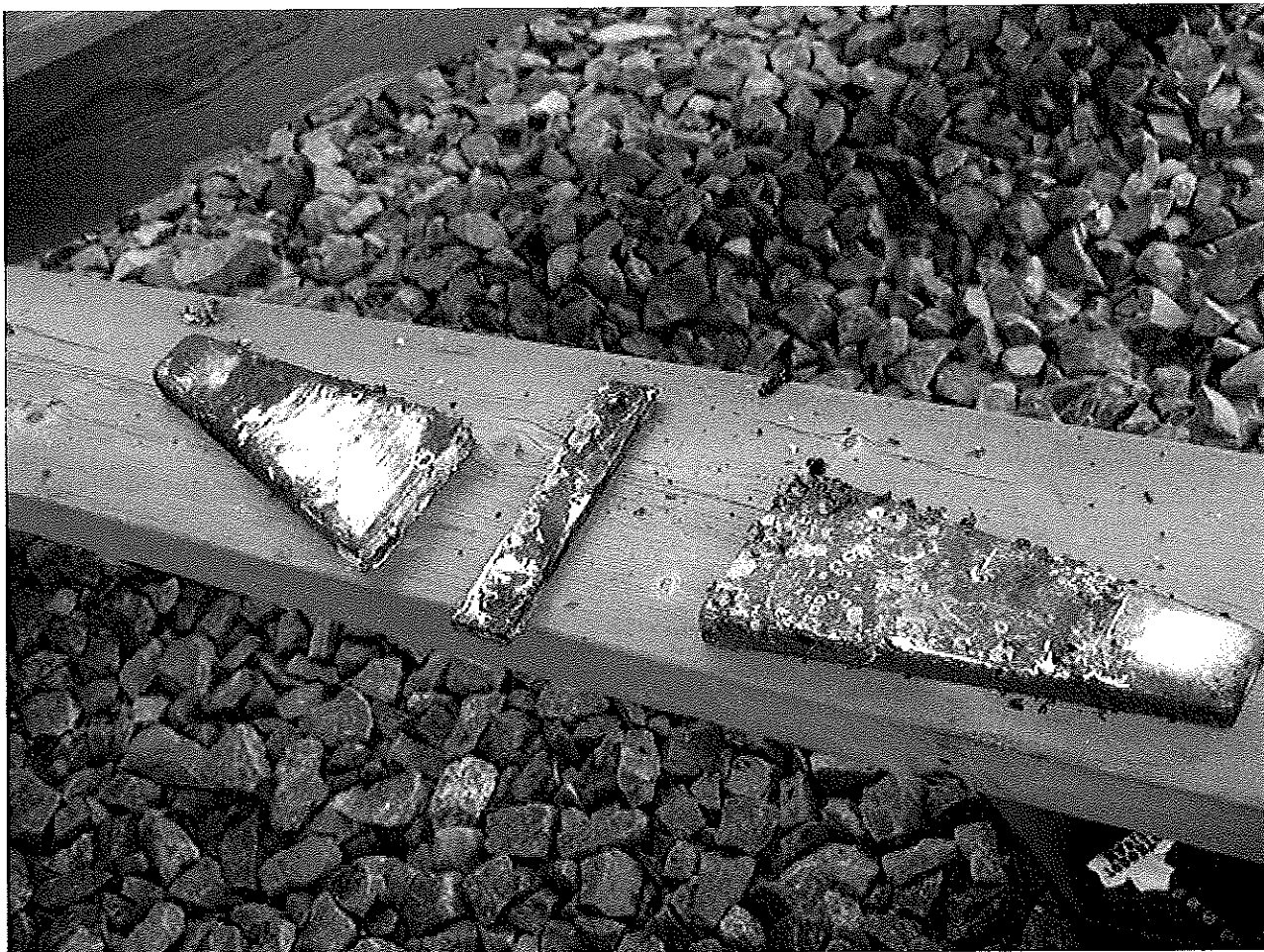
